


Baker's Cottage (Darug Country)











The Baker's Cottage Heritage Track is a guick and interesting walk. The track itself is mainly drivable road, and turns to bush track before going up the hill to the cottage. At over 145 years old, Baker's Cottage is the oldest unmodified structure, still standing, in the Kuring-gai area. All entrances to the cottage are blocked, so you can't see inside. It is worth looking around the ground to see some other historic remains. Let us begin by acknowledging the Darug people, Traditional Custodians of the land on which we travel today, and pay our respects to their Elders past and present.






Class 3 of 6 Formed track, with some branches and other obstacles

Weather	Weather generally has little impact on safety (1/6)


Before you start any journey ensure you;

- Can respond to emergencies & call for help at any point
- · Are healthy and fit enough for this journey

If not, change plans and stay safe. It is okay to delay and ask people for help.








Getting started: From the bridge, this walk heads gently uphill along the road to the intersection with the visible concrete stairs just below the National Parks Office. From the intersection, this walk follows the road uphill, keeping the short sandstone wall and National Parks office on your left. The road soon bends left and leads up past the staff parking, to an intersection (with a track on your right) marked with a large 'Great North Walk' sian.

From the intersection, the walk follows the road up the hill. The road passes over the hill, to an intersection with a track on the left, marked by wooden posts.

From the intersection, this walk heads down the hill with the river below, on the left. The walk meets a clearing on the left marked as '28 Turramburra Flat'. This walk passes a parking area on the left, and toilets on the right. The road then comes to a signposted intersection, on the right.



After 10 m pass the "The Great North Walk" (15 m on your left).



After another 25 m find the "BBQ" (15 m on your



Two free electric BBQs hotplates in sheltered picnic area. The BBQ table is 92cm high, 2.05m wide and 75cm deep. Hot plates are 45/45cm.



Then find the "Picnic Table" (10 m on your left).



Two timber slat picnic tables. The table is 79cm high, 73cm deep and 3.3m wide. The seats are 46cm high, 44cm deep and 2.7m wide (no backrest). Room for a few chairs at end. 4x2.7m slab.

After another 8 m pass the car park (5 m on your left).



Then find the "Parking Accessible" (on your left). There are 8 car parking bays in the immediate area. Three are marked mobility parking bays at the southern edge. The mobility parking area is ashphalt, 2.4m wide and 6.3m deep.



After another 20 m find the "Picnic Table" (20 m on your left).



A timber slat picnic table. The table is 79cm high, 73cm deep and 2.7m wide. The seats are 46cm high, 44cm deep and 2.7m wide (no backrest), 4x2.7m slab.



After another 4 m continue straight.






After another 40 m pass the sign (25 m on your



After another 225 m pass the car park (5 m on vour left).



After another 15 m pass the toilet (25 m on your right).



(Baker's Cottage) Continue another 65 m to find the end. Then turn around here and retrace the main route for 720 m to get back to the start.
