

## Before you start any journey ensure you;

- Tell someone you trust where you are going and what to do if you are late returning
- Have adequate equipment, supplies, skills \& knowledge to undertake this journey safely
- Consider weather forecasts, park/track closures \& fire dangers
- Can respond to emergencies \& call for help at any point
- Are healthy and fit enough for this journey

If not, change plans and stay safe. It is okay to delay and ask people for help.






Getting started: From Tryon Rd (about 40 m SW of Sydney Rd), this walk heads down the timber and dirt stairs towards the children's play equipment. The walk then continues to the far end of the cricket nets. From here, the walk heads through the open grassland then crosses the small creek and the timber bridge, passing a number of signposts. The track then heads into the bush and heads down a few steps and gently turns left. Soon, the track comes to ' Y ' intersection at the top of stone steps (on the right).

## Start.

Find the park at the start.After another 35 m find the "Lindfield Soldiers Memorial Park - children's area" ( 15 m on your right).


This park and playground is on Tryon Rd, about 40 m south west of Sydney Rd. The park has children's play equipment, picnic table, fireplaces, town water, cricket nets, open grassland and shade provided by trees.



After another 20 m pass the car park ( 20 m on your left).


After another 35 m pass the toilet ( 70 m on your left).


After another 10 m cross the bridge (about 3 m long)


After another 65 m cross the bridge (about 3 m long)


After another 40 m find the "Lindfield Rocks" (25 m on your left)


Lindfield Rocks is a series of cliffs about 10 meters high and about 80 meters long. The area is popular with rock climbers and is interesting to explore with a few small overhang caves and cracks in the rock.


After another 820 m cross the bridge (about 8 m long)


After another 300 m veer right, to head along Two Creeks Track.


After another 65 m (at the intersection of Two Creeks Track \& Gordon Creek Track) continue straight, to head along Two Creeks Track.
After another 215 m pass the "Gordon Creek Bridge" ( 6 m on your left).


After another 60 m head up the earthen steps (about 45 m long)
After another 55 m head up the earthen steps (about 20 m long)
After another 190 m come to the viewpoint.

After another 820 m continue straight, to head along Two Creeks Track.

After another 300 m (at the intersection of Two Creeks Track \& Manuwi Track) veer right, to head along Two Creeks Track

After another 400 m pass the "World War 1" (on your left).


After another 100 m continue
straight, to head along Two Creeks त्रrack.

After another 145 m pass the shelter (on your right).

After another 70 m cross the bridge (about 15 m long)


After another 15 m pass the waterfall ( 9 m on your right).


## Carlyle Road

After another 120 m (at the intersection of Little Digger Track \& Two Creeks Track) by following the "Carlyle Road" sign veer right, to head along Little Digger Track.
After another 140 m pass a seat (on your right). has a backrest.


After another 70 m find the "Little Diggers Park" (on your left).


Little Diggers Park is a bushland reserve to the north of Roseville Golf Course. The reserve protects the native flora and fauna on the banks of Moores Creek. The park was named in honour of William Hughes who lived in the area and was Australia's 7th Prime Minister. Billy Hughes was also nicknamed 'little digger' during WW1, a name he carried to his grave in death in 1952. The park is now managed by Ku-ring-ga Council, and regeneration is undertaken by the Moores Creek Bushcare Group.


Carlyle Road After another 7 m by following the "Carlyle Road" sign veer right, to head along Little Digger Track.

After another 145 m cross the ford

Start of an optional side trip: An optional side trip to Babbage Falls



Babbage Falls are on Moores Creek in East Lindfield, just off the side of the Little Diggers Track. The falls flow off a large rock platform to a small pool in the creek below. Babbage Falls are named in honour of Eden Herschel Babbage Babbage (1843-1924) was known as 'The Father of Roseville' and was committed to developing a series of tracks through the area which was then known as Roseville park.
Turn around and retrace your steps back the 7 m to the main route.

Back at the main route veer left and follow on from the 5 km waypoint.


Start of an optional side trip: An optional side trip to Little Falls


Little falls are found along the Little Digger Track in East Lindfield. The small cascade is on Moores Creek, and is a single drop over a sandstone shelf. There is a small clearing on the western bank of the creek making a quiet area to sit and rest whilst trying to spot lyrebirds. Turn around and retrace your steps back the 35 $m$ to the main route.Back at the main route turn left and follow on from the 5.1 km waypoint.


After another 125 m continue straight, to head along Little Digger Track.


After another 250 m (at the intersection of Little Digger Track \& Carnarvon Road) turn right, to head along Carnarvon Road (a residential road).


After another 185 m (at the intersection of Mycumbene Avenue \& Carnarvon Road) veer right, to head along Mycumbene Avenue.


After another 225 m (at the intersection of Woodlands Road \& Mycumbene Avenue) turn right, to head along Woodlands Road.


After another 125 m turn left, to head along Hobart Avenue.


After another 15 m turn right


After another 115 m turn right, to head along Perth Avenue.

After another 20 m turn left


After another 120 m turn left, to head along Adelaide Avenue.

After another 40 m turn right.

nother 105 m continue straight, to head along Brisbane Avenue.
